The Hide and Seek River

Tony Winkel has been called a "Water Nerd", but in actuality he is the Senior Hydro-geologist for the

Mojave Water Agency. He could speak for 6 hours on the history of the Mojave River, which he calls the "Hide and Seek River" because most of its flow is



underground, while its surface channels remain dry most of the time, with the exception of the headwaters



and several bedrock gorges in the lower reaches.

The watershed for the Mojave is in Lake Arrowhead and its course runs from Victorville, Barstow, and up to Baker. In fact, if there is a large

enough flood, the river could actually run into Death Valley. The Mojave River is very unique because not

only does it run underground, but instead of flowing toward the ocean as rivers do, the Mojave flows inland,

terminating in the middle of the desert. When the river does peek its water above ground, the river flow can be seen at the upper narrows between Victorville

and Apple Valley, then downstream past Barstow at the lower narrows as the river begins its way through Afton Canyon. The river winds down the canyon and seeps into the sand disappearing before it reaches Soda Lake near Baker.

The Mojave River has had quite a history. In 1450, a "Little Ice Age" occurred in the region and throughout different parts of the globe which caused the river to be filled. In the 1800's, Indian villages ran the length of the Mojave River and during this century, a canal was created, which Tony calls the "Hesperia Ditch" that ran from Deep Creek to where Lime Street Park now stands. In 1936 and 1937 there were a lot of rains in our region and the river started to overflow and flood, but in 1938, we had the largest rain in 70 years, which caused some devastating flooding in the High Desert. Finally, in 1971, the Forks Dam was completed and its sole purposes is for flood control.

There was a lot of information shared by Tony from its watershed, through the Victor Valley, but due to time, we had to stop by the time the river reached Barstow. We will see Tony back soon to continue the history and flow of the "Hide and Seek" River.
