Comfort During Life, Comfort at the End of Life

Mary Hennessy and the staff at Gentiva Hospice have both a heartbreaking and hugely rewarding career. This week she spoke to Rotarians on the differences in Palliative Care and Hospice Care and reasons why people tend to confuse them.

> Palliative care provides comfort during one's life and Hospice provides comfort at the end of life. Palliative care is there for us during our lives as whole person care that relieves symptoms of a disease or

The first Hospice Care Facility was in France in 1442, as a home to take care of the dying. There was no modern medical equipment and was primarily a place for spiritual needs that was perceived as a home for the poor and destitute. **Dame Cicely Saunders, MD** is known as the founder of modern hospice care. As a nurse and social worker she felt the manner in which doctors managed pain and other symptoms during the dying process could be improved. The pain she referred to was more than physical, but emotional, spiritual and social as well. She founded the St. Christopher's Hospice in London in 1967 and the industry began to grow from there.

In 1983 hospice became a Medicare member benefit and in 1996, The Hospice Medicare Benefit was passed by Congress and is now a permanent benefit. This allows more and more people to be in comfort at the end of their days, and surrounded with love, instead of fear. The industry has grown tremendously over the last 10 years and there are now more Hospice Care Facilities than ever before.

Hospice is seen as "a good death". Instead of spending one's final days in a hospital room surrounded by medical equipment and being woken up every 2 hours by a nurse to take tests, hospice allows the person at home with family and comfortable in their own surroundings.

Thank you to Mary and all of her staff for the work that you do for this inevitable situation, the ending of life.
