

Sharing Information to Combat Terrorism

Detective **Heather Forsythe** began her career as Deputy at the Victorville station under **Mark Taylor**, before she went to San Bernardino County and became a detective and head of the San Bernardino Chapter of the Terrorism Early Warning

> Group. (TEWG) Along with Heather she was joined by her partner at the County, William Hogan and Riverside Chapter head of TEWG, Michele Nelson.

> > The group holds monthly meetings with a diverse membership, including Fire, Military, city staff medical members, personnel, educators. citizens and more. The group, which began in 2001, works to discuss problems in their sectors and have open communication, which is of high importance to fighting terrorism.

This Week's Functionaries

Invocation: Flag Salute: 4-Way Test: Song: Van Young Mark Taylor Jon Schuler Al Castellucci Center (JRIC), which provides TEWG with information on assessments from suspicious calls that have come in around the county, advisory reports, BOLO's (Be on the Look Out Bulletins), threat assessments and more. This allows the group to gather information and put pieces together from different parts of the County and State to determine if a plot is in development. One such example shared is in cases of propane tanks being stolen, will be a red flag for the group.

Another agency they work closely with is the Joint Terrorism Task Force (JTTF), which is located in the Riverside FBI Office. This organization investigates both domestic and international terrorism, and has access to numerous databases. In fact, a member of the San Bernardino County Sheriff Department, is in this organization, working closely with the FBI to keep a watchful eye for any local acts of terror.

Detective Forsythe stressed the importance of reporting anything that you see is not ordinary. In the case of both terrorism or an active shooter situation, some of the signs to look out for include someone taking photos of your building, calling and asking questions regarding security cameras at your location, a person testing your security by walking up to determine if they get stopped, impersonating a company employee, and rehearsing a "dry run" to see how long it would take to hit their target.

Of course, terrorism takes on many forms. Isis puts out glossy magazines, targeting young people to join their cause, and are directing their followers to just grab a knife, or just get into their car and drive through a crowd of people. This is why the Terrorism Early Warning Group and all their resource agencies work diligently together to share and compare information, to allow them to stay one step ahead of the terrorists.

Louise Arevalo attended from reading about it in the paper. Speaking of the paper, reporter Shea Johnson and photographer James Quigg also attended to cover the story.


Finally, our stand-in this week was **Melanie Lovingood** for **Robert Lovingood**.
