

The Body Worn Camera Project

It seems more and more on the news lately we see stories of law enforcement being accused of illegal acts against civilians which have resulted in suspensions, lawsuits and in worst cases rioting. Law enforcement is now fighting back with body worn cameras to protect them from false accusations and more.

San Bernardino Sheriff Deputy **Neil Slawson** is the Team Leader for the Body Worn Camera Pilot Project in our County. Body cameras are already being used in Colorado Springs and are being tested in Long Beach. The County's program

> consist of 80 cameras that will be used by patrol officers at the Highland and Apple Valley Stations.

> > Cameras will record traffic stops, interaction with civilians, and all calls they go on. The technology used is from the company Body Worn out of Georgia and is one of the leaders in the industry. The officers wear the cameras inside their uniforms and once it snaps into place, they manually

turn them on and off by tapping on their chest. Officers will also have a bluetooth enabled wristband that they can touch to activate the camera. A router, called "The Rocket" will transfer the video recording in the trunk and when the patrol car returns to the station, the data is uploaded into the Cloud, where the footage can be reviewed instantly.

The software can also be used to successfully protect the innocent, and uninvolved parties by easily blurring out faces, tattoos, with just a click of a mouse.

If the Pilot Program is a success and these cameras are adopted, there is already technology in place to make the process better such as automatic activation of the camera when the driver's door is opened, the Code 3 Light-Bar is turned on, the shotgun rack is opened, or when the officer is running or down.

Future use of the body worn cameras can be used to eliminate outdated software, shoot evidential crime scenes, audio recordings, interviews with suspects and witnesses and officer safety notifications.

These body worn cameras serve two main purposes. One, they will protect an officer against false complaints and accusations and secondly will allow other superior officers to see what actually happens on their calls.

Hopefully, these body worn cameras will be used by all agencies in the High Desert, by not only protecting officers, but the innocent as well.
