

THE POWER OF ELECTRICITY

In the windswept Mojave Desert, where the sun beats down relentlessly and open land stretches for miles, a powerful force hums quietly in the distance. is the This High Desert Power Plant, 830-megawatt an natural gas facility nestled on the former



George Air Force Base in Victorville, California. But behind its impressive turbines and high-tech upgrades lies a deeper story of politics, ambition, and one man's enduring influence in the High Desert, as shared this week by former Victorville Mayor **Terry Caldwell**. Terry shared that the High Desert Power Plant was one of the long lasting betterments of Victorville.

At the heart of the plant's origin is **Buck Johns**, who was in attendance today with his wife. Buck was a Newport Beach businessman and founder of Inland Energy. In the late 1990s, Johns and his investor group secured a nobid contract from the City of Victorville to develop what

would become the High Desert Power Project also referred to as Victorville 1. The project was ambitious: turning a decommissioned military base into a stateof-the-art power facility capable of feeding the rapidly growing energy demands of Southern California.

By 2003, the plant was operational. But Johns' role didn't end at construction. Inland Energy continued to serve as a consultant to the project, reportedly earning millions in fees for planning and operational support. A 2010 San Bernardino County Grand Jury report later raised questions about the transparency of these contracts and the city's oversight, citing concerns over bond-funded payments and the lack of competitive bidding.

Beyond energy, Johns' influence extended into the region's most valuable resource: water. To operate a power plant of this scale, a steady supply of water for cooling was essential. Allegations arose that Johns played a role in shifting local water board elections to help secure 3,000 acre-feet of water per year for the plant—an amount critics argue could have been used to serve residential needs in the Victor Valley.

These controversies painted a complicated picture: Was Buck Johns a visionary developer pushing the *Continued on page 2*

High Desert into the future—or a power broker wielding behind-the-scenes influence to the city's detriment?

In recent years, the focus has shifted from the politics of the past to the future of clean, efficient energy. Now owned by Avenue Capital and operated by Middle River Power, the High Desert Power Plant has undergone significant upgrades between 2018 and 2023.

These upgrades not only improved efficiency and environmental compliance but also enabled the plant to better support California's renewable energy grid—serving as a dispatchable power source when solar and wind fall short.

Today, the High Desert Power Plant stands as a hybrid symbol of legacy and innovation. It reflects the ambitions of a developer who helped shape Victorville's industrial footprint—and the evolution of an industry trying to reconcile its carbon-heavy past with a cleaner, more flexible future.

As California accelerates its energy transition, facilities like the High Desert plant—equipped with cleaner technology and future-ready infrastructure will play a critical role. Whether Buck Johns' legacy is remembered more for his business acumen or the controversies that followed remains to be seen. But one thing is clear: the story of power in the High Desert is far from over.
