#### The Numbers Game: Voter Trends in California

When it comes to crunching numbers, there are few who love it more than Steve Hunt, Editor of the Daily Press. As a former sports writer, he uses numbers to analyze voting, much in the same way he did analyzing baseball. A former member of our Club, Steve spoke this week on voter demographics during the November 2016 election nationally, in California, as well as locally.

> Nationally, the turnout for eligible voters was 60.2%, which equates to million voters, new record. The 232 million eligible American voters was also a record.

> > In the area of the popular Hilliary vote. Clinton won the popular vote by 2.8 million, but that was largely

due to the fact that she had 4.2 million more votes

than Donald Trump in California. In the other 49 states and DC, Trump had 1.4 million more votes overall than Clinton. In the area of demographics the wealthy earning \$150,000 or more are twice as likely to vote as the poor and more women than men have voted in every presidential election since 1980.

Turning to California, 75.27% voted in the November 2016 election, and the highest percentage was in the Obama 2008 election at 79.42%. Residents aged 55+ make up 31% of the adult population and 48% of likely voters, while people 18-34 make up 32% of the population but are only 17% of likely voters. 24.875 million California residents were eligible to vote, and 19.4 million were registered, but only 14.6 million actually voted. Of those registered voters 44.9% are democrats, 26% are registered as Republicans and 24.3% have no party preference.

In the High Desert Adelanto has the majority of democrats with 4.2K voting for Hillary and 1.6K voting for Donald Trump. On the other side of the coin in Apple Valley, 17K voted for Trump and 9K cast votes for Clinton. The City that was the closest in votes was Barstow which had 2.6K for Trump and 2.5K for Clinton. Numbers for other High Desert cities came in at 14.K Trump/10.9K Clinton in Hesperia and 17.6K Clinton/12K Trump here in Victorville.

Finally, in local measures, the highest turnout in votes cast was 75.4% for the First District Supervisor position and 74.2% for Measure A, allocating funds for the Apple Valley Fire District. The lowest turnout in terms of votes was for Measure F in Barstow, a \$33 million school bond. Even though it would increase property taxes in a generally disadvantaged area, only 45.8% of registered voters cast ballots.
