Are You Near a Fault Line?

Most Californians live within 30 miles of at least one of the 2,000 known earthquake fault lines that flow throughout California, according to **Glenn Pomeroy**, CEO of the California Earthquake Authority, so you most likely do as well. The California Earthquake Authority is a publicly managed, privately funded non-profit organization that encourages

California homeowners reduce their risk of earthquake damage and loss through education and insurance coverage. They are very active about getting the word out on earthquake insurance, because most Californians assume it is covered under their homeowners policy, but in fact, less than 10% actually have earthquake coverage.

Glenn shared that the risk of another

earthquake is very real, with a 99% chance of a 6.7 magnitude or larger quake will happen sometime in the next 30 years, and a 75% chance of a 7.0 or stronger one will hit, which is 3 times larger than the Northridge Earthquake.

A big myth about earthquakes is that in the event of a catastrophe, the Government will bail the homeowner out and pay all the costs. While there is Federal assistance in the case of tragedies for health and safety needs, that help doesn't extended to rebuilding homes and replacing valuables. On top of that, as with any Government Loan, it must be repaid in full.

A lot of homeowners do not purchase earthquake insurance, because they have researched in the past and found that the cost is too high, too little coverage and higher than normal deductibles. The CEA has dramatically lowered rates, expanded coverage choices and now offers a wide range of deductible options, which allows anyone in any income bracket to afford earthquake coverage.

Looking back to the 6.7 magnitude Northridge Earthquake in 1994, half of the damage was to residences. The property damage in that earthquake reached \$40 Billion and with inflation up 51% in 2017, the cost will skyrocket. In terms of the economics, if the Northridge Earthquake happened today, the loss would be between \$95 - \$160 Billion, so truly now is the best time to protect yourself with earthquake coverage.
