The Civil War of Voting

The Voting process has had a long history, both rich and dark, but not many people today, understand just how divisive voting was during and after the Civil War era of our Nation, as was shared this week by Victor Valley College professor David Wilkerson.

During the Colonial era voting was extremely restrictive. "All Men are Created Equal" back then meant you were equal and could vote if you were white, male, owned property, 21 years or older, and a member of the Church of England.



After **America** claimed it's own Independence, if a man could at least afford to own property, he could vote. Basically it made it possible for all white men to have a say.

By 1790 one was then required to live in a state for at least 14 years to vote, but that was changed to 5 years in 1920. During the Civil War, the provision to own property was off the books, but instead a "Poll Tax" was introduced, that we now call a sales tax. Back then some states even required a literacy test, to make sure one voting understood the issues, even though it was up to the person allowing you to vote the authority to pass or fail anyone. Other states even had a "Faith Test"; the purpose of this was to try and keep Irish-Catholics from voting. Of course women and slaves were unable to cast a ballot. By the mid 1800's, West Coast states like California, Nevada, Utah and parts of Texas were acquired, but people living there were restricted from voting!

After the end of the Civil War, in northern states a free black man could vote and began to own property. By 1870 the 15th Amendment was ratified to make sure voting would not be based on race, your past history of servitude or religion. The word "sex" was purposely missing to make sure women were kept away from the ballot box.

On the other hand, southern states did not make it so easy on the newly freed slaves. States there re-introduced the literacy test and Poll Tax to keep blacks from voting. Mississippi and Oklahoma even began a "Grandfather Clause", saying that if your grandfather was able to vote, then you could, adding another roadblock to freed men. Eventually the Supreme Court outlawed it based on racism.

In 1920, women were finally allowed to vote and in the early 70's the voting age was dropped to 18 years old. The history of voting has had a long history, and as it continues to evolve through every decade, we will see what changes happen in the future of our Nation.
